
#### **Highlights from the World of Infection Control**

- Highlights: role of the <u>faucet aerator kit on contamination</u> of drinking water.
- Operating room air delivery design to protect patient and surgical site greater concentration of particles along walls of room.
- Notes from the field: <u>Botulism type B</u> after intravenous methamphetamine use.
- <u>Study</u> suggests overall patient outcomes have improved due to recognition and novel therapeutics for carbapenem resistant organisms.
- Characteristics of community-associated and healthcare-associated <u>Legionnaires' disease compared</u>. Listen to an <u>interview</u> with a study author.
- <u>Large Dutch study</u> duly named the HANDSOME trial shows improved hand hygiene compliance in nursing homes.
- UK study shows high proportion of newly catheterized patients in the community lack active management plan for <u>catheter removal</u>.
- Micro case study: 83 year old female with a perisplenic abscess.
- <u>Large Swedish study</u>, first of its kind to look at association of HPV vaccine and actual invasive cervical cancer risk.

- <u>WHO</u> releases flu vaccine compositions for 2021 southern hemisphere influenza season.
- Oropouche fever outbreak reported in French Guiana, France.
- Experiences of nursing home residents during the pandemic: <u>life under</u> <u>COVID-19 restrictions</u>.
- <u>Large Danish study</u> shows decreased risk for contracting COVID-19 for individuals with blood group O.
- Lessons learned from the largest Indigenous COVID-19 outbreak.
- <u>Case series</u> analyzes data from COVID-19 outbreak aboard US aircraft carrier.
- Previously seen in children, case series reviews similar COVID-19 associated multisystem inflammatory syndrome in adults.
- What's in your sewage? Researchers find wastewater surveillance may predict community COVID-19.
- Early <u>immune responses</u> underlie some severe COVID-19 cases.
- Human-animal transmission: High proportions of <u>cats and dogs</u> acquired COVID-19 from their owners; COVID-19 infections between <u>humans and</u> <u>minks</u>; lions and tigers infected at the <u>Bronx Zoo</u>.

#### **Guess the Pathogen #1**



**Etiology:** Gram-positive, spore-forming anaerobic bacillus that produces toxins, A and B.

Transmission: Fecal-oral; hands of healthcare workers.


Symptoms/clinical findings: Abdominal pain, nausea, diarrhea;

pseudomembranous colitis; toxic megacolon.

**IPAC considerations:** Contact Precautions; disinfect environment with bleach; hand hygiene with soap and water.

### **Guess the Pathogen #2**



**Etiology:** Family: Flaviviridae; Genus: *Hepacavirus*. Small (50nm), single-stranded, enveloped RNV virus.

Incubation: 2 weeks to 6 months.

**Symptoms/clinical findings:** Jaundice, fatigue, abdominal pain, loss of appetite, nausea and vomiting.

- Initial, acute infection New infections are usually asymptomatic (~70%), and some experience acute hepatitis that does not lead to life-threatening disease; anorexia, abdominal discomfort, nausea and vomiting.
  - Approximately 30% spontaneously clear the virus within 6 months of infection without treatment.
- Chronic infection hepatocellular carcinoma, cirrhosis (risk between 15% to 30% within 20 years).

**Transmission:** Parenterally by infected needles, blood transfusion, organ transplantation, contaminated medical equipment, tattoo and body piercing equipment. Less common routes of transmission are via sexual contact, sharing razors and/or toothbrushes, from mother to child during pregnancy/childbirth.
